And this is 17 to the best of your recollection, sir. 18 It was mentioned that this was a possible 19 fratricide on 4 May, and it was in the context that they thought 20 it was and that they were going to do an investigation. And, sir, who told you that?

To the best of my recollection, it was 1 2 Okay. Do you recall what he said exactly? 3 Just been informed by the that they're going to investigate this. It may have been a possible 5 fratricide. 6 7 Were you involved in any way in the initial notification of the family of the death? No. 9 Were you ----11 I gave my -- well, I was there at he memorial service on the morning of the 4th of May. I think that 12 was the right day. I pulled a TDY -- TDY in that area of 3 and 13 14 4 May. And I went and I just gave my condolences to the family 15 individually. 16 All right, sir. 17 With the exception of the father. He was 18 not available. 19 Were you involved in the initial decision to 20 appoint the 15-6 -- either 15-6 investigation into the incident? No.

- 2 submit this soldier for a Silver Star?
- No. Can I just ----
- Yes, sir.
- When I was told that it was a possible
- 6 friendly fire, my first comment was, "We need to do an
- 7 investigation." And they said they were in the process of
- 8 establishing that as an investigation. I was not in the
- 9 appointing chain of command at that time.
- Yes, sir. Once you became aware that this was a
- 11 possible fratricide, was there a conscious decision made not to
- 12 tell the family of that possibility; and, if so, why?
- On that particular day, considering what I
- 14 was told, the answer is: Yes. You know, the decision was made
- 15 not to first of all, we didn't have enough information to say
- 16 that it was. And I think what we wanted to do is make sure that
- 17 we told them the right information.
- Again, that was a memorial service. I didn't think it
- 19 was my responsibility to go up to them and say, "Hey, you know,
- 20 this is a possible friendly fire." Again, I think that that

- 1 would just not be the right thing to do personally. Again, I
- 2 didn't have any information. Mine was all hearsay.
- . Which headquarters do you believe was
- 4 responsible for telling the family that this was a fratricide?
- Well, as it came out, it was this
- 6 headquarters.
- Are you aware of anyone involved with this
- 8 fratricide or the investigation thereof being reluctant to
- 9 release that this was a fratricide?
- No.
- 11 Are you aware of anyone being told not to
- 12 discuss that this was a fratricide? If so, what were the
- 13 reasons for that instruction?
- Well, with I said, you know,
- 15 "This should not be given to the family because it's speculative
- 16 at best at this point." And that was it. I said, "We need to
- 17 wait for the 15-6."
- Were you involved in the family briefing once
- 19 the 15-6 was through?
- From the standpoint that I orchestrated it.

  We were in here orchestrating it the night of 28 May.

- Did you provide any instructions to anyone or
- 2 receive any instructions from anyone on what should be or should
- 3 not be disclosed to the family?
- Other than I was given the press statement
- 5 that was approved by CENTCOM, Army, and SOCOM to read on the
- 6 29th at a press conference.
- Were you involved in processing the 15-6 through
- 8 approval by CENTCOM?
- 9 No.
- When was the first time you had the opportunity
- 11 to see the complete 15-6 investigation, and did you see it
- 12 before approval by CENTCOM?
- No. I didn't see it before the approval by
- 14 CENTCOM, and I can't really tell you but it was after that
- 15 weekend if I'm not mistaken. I can pull my e-mail up and tell
- 16 you. Do you want me to do that? I can give you the exact date
- 17 that it was e-mailed to me. It may have been that 28th that I
- 18 got an email, but it was after it had already been approved.
- All right, sir. Who made the decision that you
- 20 should conduct a press conference to announce a fratricide?

- 7 press and give the facts as best we knew it at that time.

- anything up. I think in their heart of hearts everybody was
- 11 trying to get to the bottom line and trying to figure out really
- 12 what occurred in kind of a difficult battle space that they were
- 13 in.
- As far as the -- you know, the Silver Star comes in
- 15 and everybody said, you know, "Why was that awarded?" Again,
- 16 not out there. Those awards are made in theatre; and, as I said
- 17 in the press statement, again, my heart of hearts is that the
- 18 actions that this soldier had on the battlefield that warrant
- 19 that award or that Silver Star -- it's justified, based on the
- 20 statements and narratives provided to the commander who makes that decision.
